

HALF MILLION SEE BURIAL OF JINNAH

**Pakistan Stunned With Grief
at Loss of Leader—Naming
of Successor Awaited**

INDIA SENDS CONDOLENCES

**Effect of Death on Dominion
Relations Not Clear—King
George Offers Sympathy**

KARACHI, Pakistan, Sept. 12 (AP)—Sorrowing Pakistan buried Mohammed Ali Jinnah, Governor General and founding father of this Moslem Dominion, with full military honors tonight. Mr. Jinnah, 71, died last night after a heart attack.

A half million Moslems lined the streets for the funeral procession. Shouts of "Qaid-e-Azam [great leader] is dead! Long live Pakistan!" arose as the body was borne along the streets on a gun carriage.

Present for the funeral were Ministers and officials of the Pakistan Government and the entire diplomatic corps in this capital city.

Four Cabinet ministers, including Premier Liaqat Ali Khan, helped lift the bier to the gun carriage.

Mrs. Dinah Wadia, only daughter of Mr. Jinnah, and his sister, Miss Fatima Jinnah, were present for the final rites.

Speculation on Successor

Government circles here said tonight they expected an official announcement from London at any moment appointing the successor to Mr. Jinnah as Governor General.

Official circles mentioned Sir Gulam Hussein Hidayatullah, Premier of the Sind Province, as a possible successor to Mr. Jinnah. These sources said that Premier Liaqat Ali Khan had indicated that he preferred to remain in his present post.

[In London Commonwealth officials stated that Mr. Jinnah's successor would be appointed shortly, and that he would be a person, Briton or Pakistani, recommended by Pakistan, The Associated Press reported.]

The crowds gathered early in front of Government House, where Mr. Jinnah's body lay in state before the military funeral that Pakistan had decreed for its beloved leader. The people clamored for a chance to see Mr. Jinnah's body for a final time and the doors were flung open.

The resultant scenes were reminiscent of the emotion that was displayed at the death early this year of Mohandas K. Gandhi. Women started to scream. Men in the assemblage could not control their tears. Many were sobbing.

Mr. Jinnah's death caused profound shock to members of the Government.

A forty-day period of mourning was decreed by the Government. The Pakistani flag was lowered to half staff over all buildings.

The Premier pledged in a broadcast that the Cabinet would "carry on with unfaltering determination the great task to which Qaid-e-Azam Jinnah, father of the nation, devoted himself after the achievement of Pakistan."
